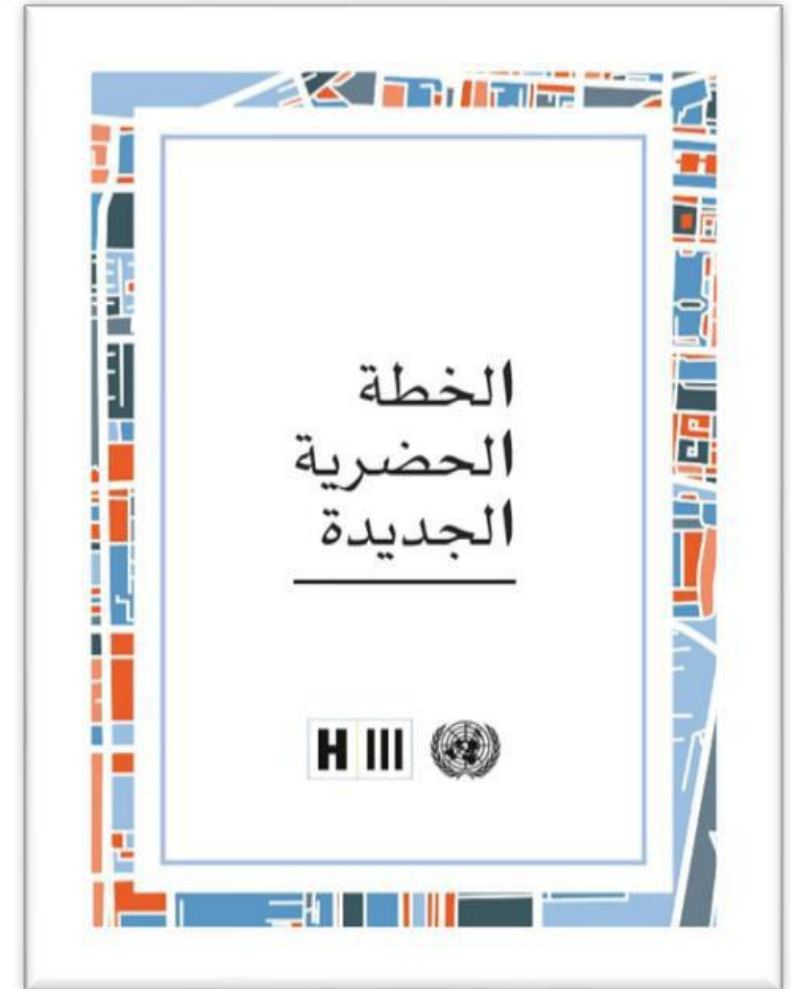
Target	Target Description
11-1	By 2030 ensure access for all to adequate, safe and affordable housing and basic services and upgrade slums
11-2	By 2030, provide access to safe , affordable, accessible and sustainable transport systems for all, improving road safety, notably by expanding public transport, with special attention to the needs of those living in vulnerable situations, women, children, persons with disabilities and older persons
11-3	By 2030, enhance inclusive and sustainable urbanization and capacity for participatory, integrated and sustainable human settlements planning and management in all countries
11-4	Strengthening efforts to protect and safeguard the world's cultural and natural heritage
11-5	By 2030, significantly reduce the number of deaths and the number of people affected and substantially decrease the direct economic losses relative to global gross domestic product caused by disasters , including water-related disasters, with a focus on protecting the poor and people in vulnerable situations
11-6	By 2030, reduce the adverse per capita environmental impact of cities , including by paying special attention to air quality and municipal and other waste management
11-7	By 2030, provide universal access to safe, inclusive and accessible, green and public spaces , in particular for women, children, older persons and persons with disabilities

New Urban Agenda Monitoring Framework and Related Indicators

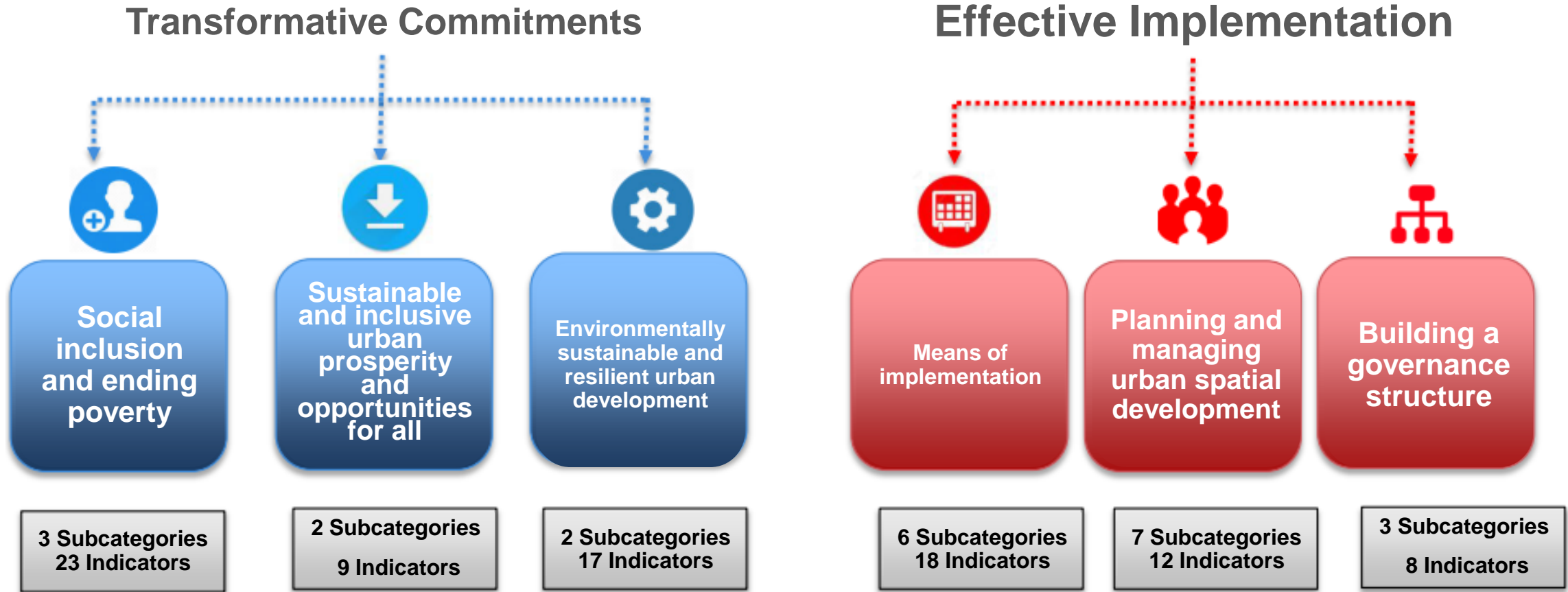
The New Urban Agenda Monitoring Framework is aligned with **the SDGs** and with the “Guidelines for Reporting on the Implementation of the New Urban Agenda” and various other tools being developed for urban monitoring of the SDGs.

In this context, more than half of the **77 indicators** currently proposed for the New Urban Agenda monitoring framework reflect different levels of data disaggregation to ensure that no person or place is left behind.



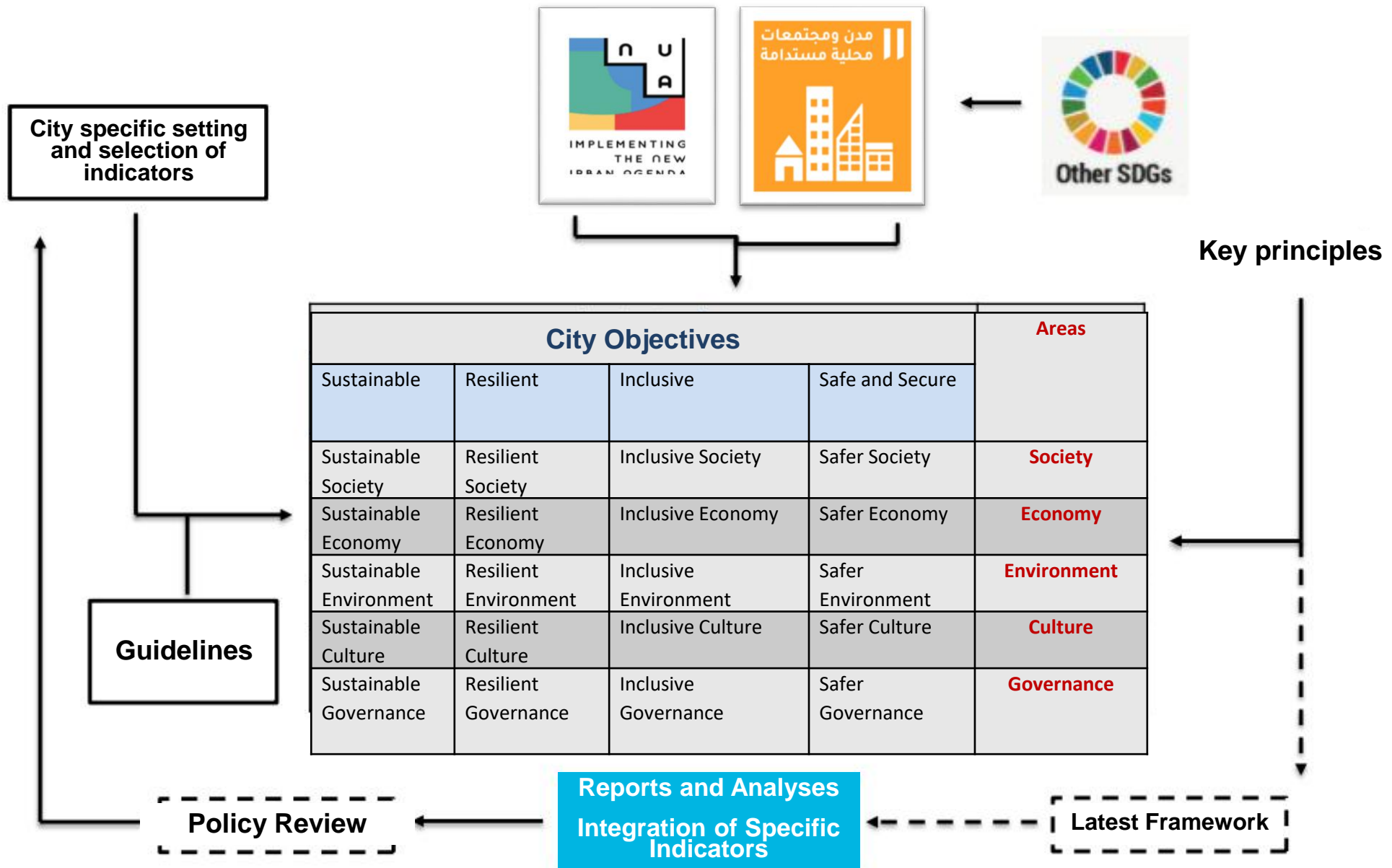
Interconnectedness between the Voluntary National Reviews (VNR) and the Voluntary Local Reviews (VLR)

New Urban Agenda Monitoring Framework and Related Indicators



- **Nearly 40%** of the SDG monitoring and follow-up framework indicators are part of the proposed core indicators for the New Urban Agenda monitoring framework.
- Monitoring the New Urban Agenda will directly contribute to monitoring the SDGs and vice versa.

Global Urban Monitoring Framework



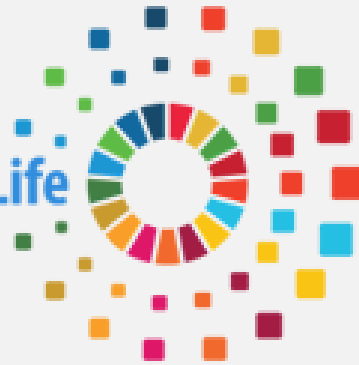
